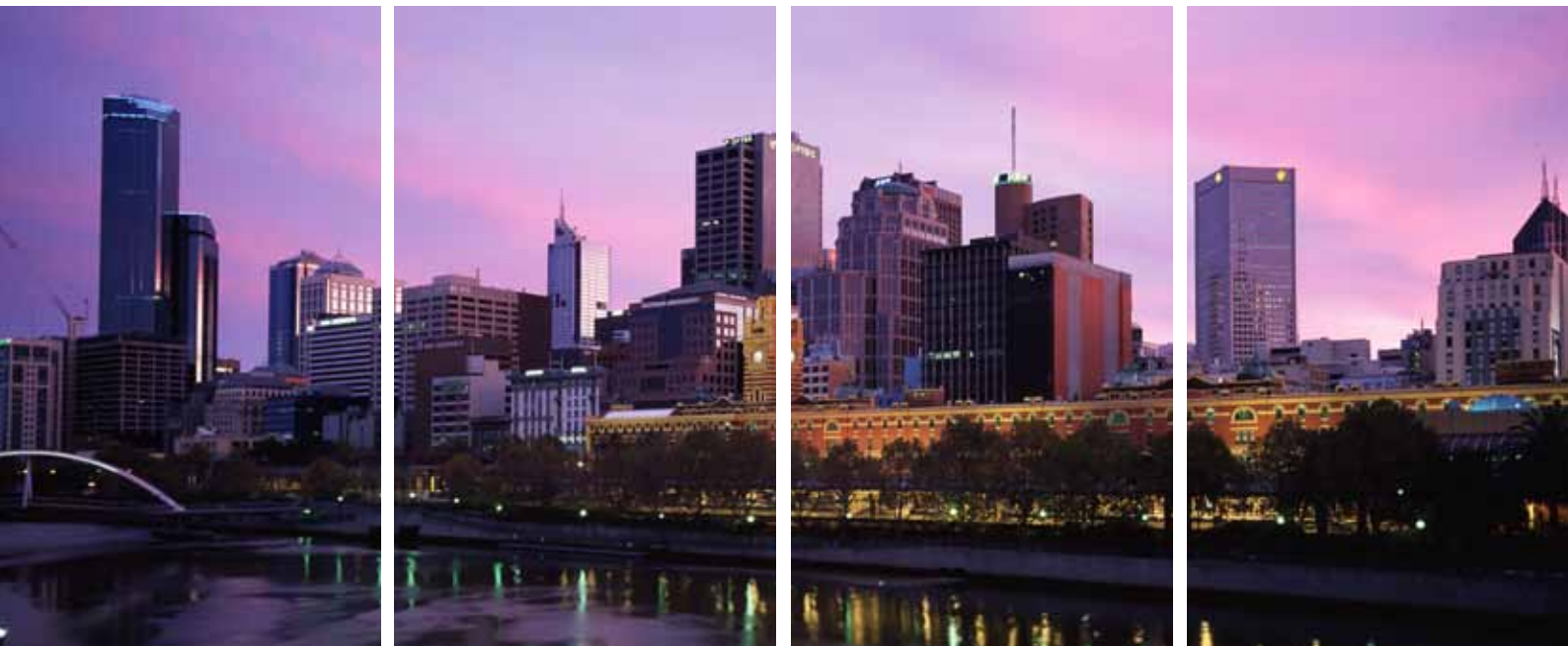

Keynote Presenters



Dr Robert E. Brackett PhD

Robert E. Brackett, PhD, is IIT Vice President and Director of the Institute for Food Safety and Health (IFSH) at the Illinois Institute of Technology, formerly the National Center for Food Safety and Technology (NCFST). After joining NCFST in July 2010, Dr. Brackett was responsible for transitioning NCFST to a principal operating unit within the newly formed Institute, which officially launched in April 2011. With nearly 30 years of experience in scientific research in industry, government and academia Dr. Brackett most recently served as senior vice president and chief science and regulatory officer for the Grocery Manufacturers Association (GMA), a position he held since 2007. Prior to his position at GMA, he worked at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Center for Food Safety and Applied Nutrition (FDA CFSAN), where he started as a senior microbiologist in the Office of Plant and Dairy Foods and Beverages in 2000. After several promotions, Dr. Brackett was appointed CFSAN Director, where from 2004-2007 he provided executive leadership to CFSAN's development and implementation of programs and policies relative to the composition, quality, safety and labeling of foods, food and color additives, dietary supplements and cosmetics. Earlier in his career, Dr. Brackett held professorial positions with North Carolina State University in Raleigh, and the University of Georgia in both its Department of Food Science and Technology and the Center for Food Safety and Quality Enhancement.

Dr. Brackett is a fellow in the International Association for Food Protection and American Academy of Microbiology and a member of the International Association for Food Protection, Institute of Food Technologists, and the American Society for Microbiology. He has been honored with the FDA Award of Merit, the International Association for Food Protection's President's Appreciation Award, and most recently, the William C. Frazier Food Microbiology Award. Dr. Brackett received his doctorate in food microbiology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Dr Angela Merianos

Angela Merianos is public health physician/communicable disease epidemiologist (MPH, MAE, FAFPHM) and has worked in communicable disease control since 1990, at territory (NT Communicable Disease Control Centre, NT Health), national (Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing) and international (AusAID) before joining the Dangerous Pathogens unit, WHO Geneva in January 2003 seconded by the Australian government to adapt the US smallpox guidelines to a global setting. Within a month of arrival Angela was redeployed to work on the SARS response as the WHO HQ SARS Focal Point and convener of the global SARS Epidemiology Working Group and later deployed to Sri Lanka for WHO's response to the Asian Tsunami in 2004 before returning to Australia.

From April 2005 – July 2006, Angela was an Associate Professor at the Australian Biosecurity Cooperative Research Centre, Curtin University of Technology, Perth, where her main project was carrying out a risk assessment for emerging infectious diseases in northern Australia in collaboration with academic institutions and health services in northern Western Australia, the Northern Territory and Queensland.

In August 2006, she returned to WHO Geneva as Team Lead, Risk Assessment and Decision Support team, Alert and Response Operations Unit, Health Security and Environment Cluster. Her team was responsible for global event-based surveillance, the rapid risk management of acute public health events using an all-hazards approach under the IHR (2005), risk assessment training for countries, outbreak investigation and response to infectious disease outbreaks and post-disaster response and assessment. In June 2008, Angela was part of a joint WHO and World Bank Mission supporting the Chinese government in their recovery phase planning after the Sichuan Province earthquake.

Angela has been involved in outbreak investigations including arboviral disease (RRV, BFV, sandfly fever), epidemic gonococcal conjunctivitis, group A meningococcal meningitis, melioidosis, myocarditis, laboratory-acquired SARS, cholera. She left WHO in June, 2012 to return to Australia.



Dr Yonatan (Yoni) Segal

Dr Yoni Segal gained his DVM degree from Bari University, Italy in 1987. Over the years he has been involved with the poultry industry as a technical and breeding manager for commercial poultry companies in Israel and Australia, and as the regional technical manager, Asia-Pacific for a multinational pharmaceutical company, CEVA Animal Health. In these roles he has developed and delivered comprehensive courses designed to update poultry professionals on the latest advances in poultry production and disease control, including sessions on the development of farm management and vaccination programs.

Since early 2007 Dr Segal has been engaged in avian influenza (HPAI) prevention and control projects in South and South – East Asia, with the FAO, USAID, and other international agencies. In this role he has developed and delivered training programs on biosecurity for government veterinarians, the commercial poultry industry, hatcheries and live-bird market operators. From March 2009 through April 2012 Dr Segal was based in FAO head quarters in Rome managing the Public Private Partnerships project which focused on the improvement of dialogue and collaborations between the public and private sectors through the development and implementation of national biosecurity guidelines for the commercial poultry industry, compensation strategies and compartmentalization plans in HPAI affected countries.

Currently Dr Segal holds the position of the principal veterinary officer, poultry and emerging diseases at the chief veterinary office unit of the Victorian Department of Primary Industries (DPI).

Dr Segal has published numerous papers in international poultry magazines.



Dr Tom Calma (AO)

Dr Calma is an Aboriginal elder from the Kungarakan tribal group and a member of the Iwaidja tribal group in the Northern Territory. Dr Calma was appointed as National Coordinator for Tackling Indigenous Smoking to lead the fight against tobacco use in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in March 2010. His most recent previous position was that of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner at the Australian Human Rights Commission from 2004 to 2010. While at the Commission he was also the Race Discrimination Commissioner from 2004 to 2009. In his 2005 Social Justice Report Dr Calma called for the life expectancy gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people to be closed within a generation and in 2006 established the Close the Gap campaign.

Dr Calma has worked in the public sector for over 38 years in roles including bureaucrat, senior academic, senior diplomat (India and Vietnam) and senior advisor to a Minister. His achievements are many but most notably in recent years they include responding to the Prime Minister's Apology on behalf of Indigenous peoples and Chairing the Steering Committee to establish the National Congress of Australia's First Peoples.

In 2010, Dr Calma was awarded an honorary doctorate from Charles Darwin University in recognition of decades of public service, particularly in relation to his work in education, training and employment in Indigenous communities and in 2011 an Honorary Doctorate from Curtin University in recognition of his work in higher education both in Australia and internationally and in Indigenous health. In a special July 2010 edition by the Australian Doctor magazine Dr Tom Calma has been named one of the 50 most influential people in Australian medicine.

He is patron and board member of a number of national organizations and was recently awarded the Order of Australia (OA) in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for his distinguished service to the Indigenous community as an advocate for human rights and social justice, and his contributions to government policy and reform, and to cross cultural understanding.

Concurrent Session Synopsis

CONCURRENT SESSION 1

The environmental health response to cases of hoarding and squalor *Natalie Allaz-Barnett, Environmental Health Unit, Department of Health, VIC*

Hoarding behaviour and squalid living environments pose a number of problems and concerns in a person's life. Responding to hoarding and squalor can involve laws, policies and requirements in areas as diverse as sanitation, safety, mental health, animal protection and building safety. Due to their complexity, cases can be time-consuming to address and require responses from a range of government and non-government service providers. The demand for response is increasing and a broad range of service responses is currently occurring. A particular challenge for service providers is knowing which other service providers to engage with. The Department of Health is leading a project to address this issue and guidance material is nearing completion. One of the objectives of the guidance material is to assist EHOs to understand their role in this broad response framework.

Remediation of clandestine drug laboratories - guidance for councils *Dr Jason Issa, Health Protection Branch, Department of Health, VIC*

Clandestine drug laboratories (clan labs) are a potential public health risk due to residual contamination of a property and its surrounding environment from the illicit manufacturing of drugs. Clan labs are considered a nuisance under the Public Health and Wellbeing Act 2008. To protect the health of occupiers, neighbours and the public, property owners are required to remediate residual contamination from a clan lab following the completion of an investigation by Victoria Police. Councils should investigate clan labs found in their municipal district. In most cases, this may be limited to councils ensuring that affected property owners understand and carry out remediation to the satisfaction of a qualified assessor.

More than just annoying – the public health nuisance *Marcus Heath, Russell Kennedy, VIC*

This workshop will explore the concept of the public health nuisance as distinct from what would otherwise be a private nuisance at common law. Participants in the workshop should gain a greater understanding of: what constitutes a public health nuisance; evidentiary requirements; and how to respond to a nuisance complaint.

Mornington Peninsula Shire Best Bites Food Guide Program *Peter O'Brien, Mornington Peninsula Shire Council, VIC & Rob Gell, representing Westernport Biosphere, VIC*

Mornington Peninsula Shire introduced the Best Bites Food Guide Program in 2011 to assess and promote food businesses in the areas of food safety, allergen awareness, healthy eating, tobacco and alcohol service, sustainability, and access for all. This free, innovative program is the first such scheme in Victoria and aims to support food businesses by increasing their patronage and reducing their costs.

The Best Bites Food Award Program has been implemented at all of the Shire's registered food businesses and was developed by the Shire's Environmental Health Officers.
